All Agreed Review proposed Grounds Maintenance requirements with a view to agreeing a final FC23:**95** requirement to be issued for quotations. Circulated, Existing specification also circulated for reference. Consider level of maintenance at the Cemetery with regard to the overall cost for this area compared to other public spaces. Minute FC23: 74.4 refers. Brief Circulated The proposed grounds maintenance schedule was reviewed in detail and decisions recorded on the face of the schedule. It was proposed that once these amendments have been made this document should form the basis of an invitation to quote. All Agreed The level of maintenance was considered during the review and it was proposed that options should be requested to allow an informed decision on costs. All Agreed It was noted that there was a perpetual issue with artificial flowers creating litter around the cemetery, particularly when mowing machinery chops them up. The following potential solutions were suggested: 1. Recommend that the Cemetery Regulations are updated to ban artificial flowers. The benefits are twofold: There would be a reduction in plastic waste Any flowers that were pulled out by deer would be chopped by mowing machinery and will decompose naturally. 2. If artificial flowers remain, the time to clear them would be immediately before grass cutting, which may not be practical. 3.
